# Coronavirus (COVID-19): Contingency Plan

Please note: this plan has been created in line with the advice regarding contingency planning in the DfE's 'Full opening guidance: schools'. National guidance has been issued by the DfE for how schools should operate during a local lockdown, and a tier system has been established by the Department of Health and Social Care as part of its 'Contain framework'. This operates on the basis of four tiers. Tiers 1-3 only apply to schools with pupils in Year 7 and above and range from introducing the use of face coverings to creating a rota system for attendance, whereas Tier 4 necessitates that all education settings only remain open to vulnerable children and the children of critical workers. It is important, however, that schools remain aware that every local lockdown may be different depending on the circumstances of the area. If a local lockdown is implemented in your area, you must follow the specific guidance for your area. We will ensure this plan is updated in line with national government guidelines regarding the operation of schools during local lockdowns.

# The aim of this plan

If a local area sees a spike in coronavirus (COVID-19) infection rates that is resulting in localised community spread, appropriate authorities will decide which measures to implement to help contain the spread – these measures could include the partial closure of schools in the area, and different tiers of restrictions.

This document outlines how the school will operate if a local lockdown or restrictions are implemented. If a local lockdown is implemented in our area, the school will work closely with the local health protection team (HPT) and implement provisions as advised by the team.

This is a live document that will be reviewed by the headteacher in conjunction with other key stakeholders as and when the situation develops.

### Infection prevention and control

The school's Coronavirus Risk Assessment will continue to be adhered to – this risk assessment meets the requirements set out in the DfE's system of controls.

Any member of the school community who displays symptoms of coronavirus will be encouraged to get a test. Tests can be booked online or ordered by telephone via NHS 119. Essential workers, including school staff, have priority access to testing.

If a pupil develops symptoms of coronavirus while on site, they will be taken to a designated isolation area while they wait to be collected. If required, the pupil will be supervised while they await collection. If the supervising member of staff is unable to maintain social distancing, e.g. due to the pupil's age or needs, they will wear PPE. After the pupil has left the premises, any areas they were in will be cleaned. The pupil's parents will be encouraged to get their child tested. The pupil will be required to self-isolate for at least 10 days.

If a staff member develops symptoms while on site, they will be directed to go home to self-isolate and to get a test. Cover arrangements will be put in place.

Any staff members or pupils who have been in close contact with a symptomatic individual do not need to self-isolate unless they develop symptoms themselves or the individual subsequently tests positive.

If an individual tests positive, the school will contact the local HPT. The individual's close contacts at school will be sent home to self-isolate for 14 days and encouraged to get a test. If more individuals test positive, the school will follow advice from the local HPT, which may include requiring more people to self-isolate.

#### Remote education

If a local lockdown is implemented, the school will offer immediate access to remote education for pupils who are required to remain at home. If there is not a local lockdown, but a single class or bubble needs to self-isolate, the school will immediately implement remote learning for that group.

#### **Teaching and learning**

All pupils will have access to high-quality education when remote working.

The school will use a range of teaching methods to cater for all different learning styles. This includes:

- 3 lessons a day either set through Office365 (Key Stage 2) or via the website (KS1 and Reception)
- Completing work in a variety of ways in their books or online
- · Using apps such as flipgrid
- Supporting learning through Microsoft Teams.
- Teachers sharing videos of themselves reading or teaching a concept.
- At least 2 live lessons a week.
- Ensure a broad and balanced curriculum.

Teachers will ensure lessons are inclusive for all pupils and can be adapted to account for the needs of disadvantaged pupils and pupils with SEND. We will support SEND children through live interventions with a teacher or a teacher assistant where appropriate. This is particularly important for children on an EHCP plan.

When teaching pupils who are working remotely, teachers will:

- Set tasks so that pupils have meaningful and ambitious work each day.
- Deliver a planned, coherent and well-sequenced curriculum which allows skills to be built incrementally.
- Provide frequent, clear explanations of new content through high-quality curriculum resources, including through educational videos.
- Assess progress by using questions and other suitable tasks and be clear on how regularly work will be checked.
- Adjust the pace or difficulty of what is being taught in response to questions or assessments, including, where necessary, revising material or simplifying explanations to ensure pupils' understanding.

All provisions for remote learning will be subject to the class group's age, ability and/or any SEND.

Teachers will continue to make use of formative assessments throughout the academic year, e.g. quizzes.

Homework is being set through Office365 and Microsoft Teams in September 2020 so that the Key Stage 2 children are even more familiar with remote learning. This should enable them to move seamlessly to remote learning if needed.

The school will utilise the support available through the DfE's 'Get help with technology during coronavirus (COVID-19)' scheme. Under the scheme, the school can order laptops, tablets and 4G wireless routers to support the following groups of pupils if they do not have access to a digital device or the internet through other means:

- Pupils in Years 3 to 11
- Clinically extremely vulnerable children across all year groups who are shielding or self-isolating in line with government and/or clinical advice
- Children in all year groups who are unable to access remote education whilst attending school on a hospital site

Before distributing devices, the school will ensure:

- The devices are set up to access remote education.
- Appropriate safeguarding controls and support are in place to help pupils and their families use the devices safely.

Once devices are ready for collection, the school will either arrange for them to be collected by families from school or delivered to pupils' homes, ensuring infection control measures are adhered to as part of this process.

In Key Stage 2, work will be set using Class Notebook in Microsoft Teams. This can be accessed on a variety of devices including computers, tablets, phones and even games consoles.

#### Returning to school

The headteacher will work with the LA to ensure pupils only return to school when it is safe for them to do so. Prior to the return of more pupils and staff, all relevant risk assessments will be reviewed.

After a period of self-isolation, or the lessening of local lockdown rules, the headteacher will inform parents when their child will return to school.

The headteacher will listen to all concerns that parents may have about their child returning to school and will advise them of the measures in place to ensure the safety of their child.

# Safeguarding

Ensuring safeguarding arrangements remain effective while the school is partially closed is a key priority.

Our Child Protection Policy was updated during the national lockdown to include provisions for keeping pupils safe during the coronavirus pandemic – we will continue to follow these procedures for pupils who remain at home, where appropriate, until all pupils are able to return to school.

We will continue to ensure that:

- The best interests of pupils always come first.
- If anyone in the school has a safeguarding concern about a pupil, they act immediately.
- A DSL or deputy DSL is always available.
- Unsuitable individuals are not permitted to work with pupils or come into contact with pupils whilst on site.
- Pupils who remain at home are protected when they are online.

## **Food provision**

We will ensure measures are in place so that meals can be prepared and served safely for pupils who remain on site.

The school catering team will work with our food providers to ensure we can continue offering FSM to pupils and families who are eligible. This includes eligible pupils who are not in attendance because they are self-isolating:

- Have had symptoms or have tested positive
- Are a close contact of someone who has coronavirus
- Are not attending due to local lockdown arrangements

#### Communication

The school will communicate its plan for a local lockdown with parents, including whether it will remain open to vulnerable pupils and children of critical workers, any reviews of the protective measures as part of its risk assessments, or if remote working will be applicable for all. All relevant stakeholders will be kept up-to-date with the circumstances of the local lockdown and how it affects the school as they develop.

If any member of the school community wishes to discuss any concerns relating to the school's provision during this period, they should contact the following as appropriate:

- Staff the headteacher or deputy headteacher
- Pupils their class teacher or headteacher
- Parents the class teacher or headteacher

This plan will be reviewed continually in line with guidance from the government and Public Health England (PHE).
