Dear Parents,

On Monday, I am sure you will have seen in the media some reporting on the effects of lockdown on children 5 years on. Research shared with the BBC indicates that the poorest children are missing more school and falling further behind their classmates. The Education Policy Institute (EPI) found that children from the lowest income families are now up to 19 months behind their peers by age 16, a gap exacerbated by the Covid-19 pandemic. Education Secretary Bridget Phillipson highlighted that the pandemic has significantly impacted attendance, with 15% of primary children in England missing at least one in ten school days this year, compared to 8% before Covid. Although efforts had previously narrowed the gap between the poorest students and their peers, the report suggests it is widening again. The gap, measured using GCSE results, could reduce from 19 months to 15 months if school attendance were equal for all pupils.

The reason I'm sharing this with you is just to highlight the importance of the children's attendance. It is probably the strongest evidence in education. The link between children, their attendance and their future life-chances are stark. We are lucky at Our Lady's to have such great attendance and I'm over the moon that, after 5 years, our attendance is now back to where it was before the pandemic. But it is something we could all be mindful of because every day matters.

Unusually, school has been quite quiet this week. Just good solid learning taking place everywhere I look. There were still a couple of things outside the normal routine with Year 4 taking part in a very enjoyable benchball festival on Tuesday morning. And then Lenten Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament on Tuesday afternoon. As we journey nearer to the Beatification of Carlo Acutis, I can't think of anything more special than spending time with Jesus something which Carlo was a real advocate of.



### **Doodlemaths**

Just to let the Key Stage 1 parents know that our subscription for doodlemaths comes to an end at the end of March. It is quite expensive and Numbots and Timestable Rockstars are not only better for the children's fluency but also a lot more reasonable. You can carry on using Doodlemaths at the moment, but we will send out the information again about Numbots to you in the next few weeks. Once the children complete Numbots, they can move onto Timetable Rockstars. If you really liked doodlemaths, there are options for parents to purchase it themselves. Unfortunately, the current usage in school didn't justify the £750 a year for the school.

### **Attendance**

# Why is it so important that my child's attendance is as close to 100% as possible?

A school the size of Our Lady's cost about  $\pm 1.2$  million a year to run. That equates to approximately:

£6,315	Per day
£5,770	Per child per year
£30	Per child per day

The overall school attendance is 97.4% at the moment which is great and massively above the national average. But it is still £28,800 worth of direct education missed.

The national average is 94.7% which, in a school like Our Lady's, equates to £63,600. Imagine that across every school in the country.

I know that not every child in school will go the whole year without being too sick to come to school at all. But when you are thinking about whether you need to keep your child at home, please remember that somebody else is paying for it. I have 4 children, and I know there is no way my income tax covers my 4 children's education.

### Parking and Dropping Off

Just a quick reminder to park sensibly in the local area. Please be aware of people's driveways so that they can get to and from their houses.

Also, I've been monitoring the car park a few times this week. There are a few groups of people using the car park:

- People, often elderly, with mobility issues who have permission from me.
- People with blue badges.
- Two people who have won the PTA raffle for the term.
- A very small group of selfish people.

Please keep our children safe by refraining from using the car park and walk the extra 50 metres.

If your child is in Key Stage 2 and you wish to drop them, I would suggest you drop them in Chiltern Rd between 8.35 and 8.50. At this time, there are plenty of people around. It is much safer to do that than drop them in a car park full of cars.


Every runner will donate £5 towards the cause for every run they complete.


We meet up every afternoon in the park at around 16:15 and run an easy 5km. So come join us in the challenge and complete a run with us!

## March 2025

March marks the beginning of Lent, a time in the Church that focuses on prayer, fasting and almsgiving (charitable giving). This year also brings the added invitation to explore and grow our friendship with God through the celebrations of the <u>Year of Jubilee</u>.

The season brings an exciting opportunity to slow down, put the most important things first and experience the joy that God offers each one of us.

This newsletter shares some of the content children will experience in school throughout March, and suggests ways for you to engage with them about it. We hope it is a useful resource for your family prayer time.

### **JUBILEE JOY: FREEDOM**

Our Lent series of Celebration of the Word Assemblies begins by exploring the Year of Jubilee theme of slavery and freedom. Inspired by Jesus' temptation in the desert, children will explore how we can all be 'slaves' to things that distract or stop us from following in God's way. Children learn about the true freedom that God offers all people and that when we put God first, we can experience the freedom that only God can give.

With your child/ren, you might like to ...

- Read the account of Jesus' 40 days in the desert together (Luke 4:1-13), and notice how Jesus found the strength to say 'no' to temptation.
- Discuss the habits, thoughts or temptations that you would like to be freed from and how you might support one another in achieving this.
- Research the Jubilee themes shared in March: forgiveness, managing debt, care for creation and restoration of the family.
- Listen to our prayer reflection song for the Year of Jubilee 'Song of Hope' by One Life Music that has been made available in the <u>Parent Portal</u>. You might like to talk about how experiencing freedom, hope and joy helps you to grow your friendship with God before you listen.

### **MORE TO THE STORY**

Jesus knows that we need help to understand God's way, so He taught using parables. During the week beginning the 3rd of March, in the Celebration of the Word Assembly, children will discover how Jesus' stories give us clues on how to live holy lives and love others like God loves.

You might like to take this opportunity with your child/ren to ...

- Play a game of charades, acting out different fairytale stories and then talk about the moral or lesson that the story teaches.
- Use the Prayer for Peace in your family prayer time to invite God to help you love others, even when it is difficult.

Lord, make me an instrument of your peace: where there is hatred, let me sow love; where there is injury, pardon; where there is doubt, faith; where there is despair, hope; where there is darkness, light; where there is sadness, joy. Amen

### **JESUS, SHINE YOUR LIGHT**

The prayers for the week beginning the 17th March use religious artwork to reflect on aspects of Jesus' nature. Inspired by the Transfiguration, where some of the disciples witnessed Jesus' face shining, children will consider how artists have expressed Jesus' divine, Godly nature through their work, to help others know Him.

Through exploration of the images, children ask Jesus - the King, our teacher and friend - to shine His light and enlighten our minds so we can understand more about Him.

You might like to use this prayer as you pray together:

Jesus, you are with me as I pray. Shine your light on me today. Amen
