RSPB Big Garden Birdwatch 28 – 30 Jan 2022

This weekend the RSPB are running their annual Big Garden Birdwatch. This is an important annual event as it helps them monitor the populations of our native birds. They can then give us advice on how to attract and help these birds.

Did you know that, since the 1970s, the house sparrow population has declined by 60% in towns and cities?

This is a great way to help your children identify our native birds and to learn how they can help them.

What you need to do

- 1. Watch the birds around you for one hour.
- 2. Count how many of each species of bird lands on your patch.
- 3. Go online and tell the RSPB what you saw.

White Rose – Maths App for Reception and Key Stage 1

White Rose have released a new app which can be used by children in Key Stage 1 or Reception, or children in Key Stage 2 who are struggling with some basic number work.

1-Minute Maths offers children engaging and easily accessible practice in basic number. There's no specific route or starting point. Having chosen a topic, each user answers a series of randomly generated questions (a different set of questions every time means they learn the concept, not a sequence of answers).

When the one minute's up, the questions are automatically marked and presented on a breakdown screen, giving instant feedback on how they've done. If they're struggling with a question, a 'Hint' button reformats the question as a familiar manipulative display that mirrors the approaches used in the White Rose Maths schemes of learning.



Knife and Fork – We need your help






