Dear Parents,

He has been popping in quite regularly over the last half term working with groups of pupils. We are so lucky to have two priests who are so good with the children. Reception Admissions 2023 - 2024

A quick reminder that admissions for Reception 2023 are open but close shortly after Christmas. Please remember that you need to fill in a form for school as well as applying in the normal way through Buckinghamshire Council. Forms are available in the school office, and in the local parishes.

Attendance Monitoring

A number of families have received letters to inform them that their child or children's attendance was below 90% last term. This is the level that children are identified as persistent absentees when the Department for Education collect data from schools. We are under a new obligation this year to monitor those children more closely and refer them to the local authority if their attendance doesn't improve. I have had to send out about 20 letters this term, which is the most I can ever remember. If you are not sure what your child's attendance is then please contact the office who can let you know.

The national evidence is pretty clear on achievement and attendance:

| Attendance | Percentage of Children achieving the expected level at the end of Year 6 |
|----------------------|---|
| 100% | 94.6% |
| 95%-100% | 88% |
| 90% - 95% | 80.2% |
| 85% - 90% | 70.4% |
| 80% - 85% | 61.5% |
| 75 % - 80% | 56.5% |
| Less than 75% | 48.5% |

As a school, we also see this connection between how well children do and their attendance. Children who have 100% attendance are almost guaranteed to get to the expected levels. Once attendance is below 90% then basically 3 out of every 10 children won't achieve the expected level.

I cannot emphasise enough the important of good attendance. We work so hard to get our children into good schools and yet we can completely negate the unbelievably positive effect a school has if our children have poor attendance.
